CHEMISTRY STUDENTS SUCCESS IN CAMBRIDGE CHEMISTRY CHALLENGE



A Level Chemistry students recently achieved some brilliant results in the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge (C3L6) - The Lower Sixth competition.

The competition aims to stretch and challenge students interested in chemistry, and provides an excellent experience for those considering taking their studies further. Set by an experienced team of teachers and university chemists, the competition takes the form of a 90 minute written paper and is designed for students studying in the UK in Year 12 (Lower 6th) or below but will take them significantly beyond the syllabus and encourage them to think about science in the way they would at university.

At Callywith this year, the first cohort of students to attempt this challenge achieved some fantastic results. Of the 36 students that entered, there were an impressive 4 silver medals awarded and 15 copper medals. The students found the challenge fun and engaging; they really stretched their chemical knowledge on the famous 'nanoputians' with their multiple double bond equivalents, keto-enol tautomerisation and the chemistry of aluminium.



SENIOR MATHS CHALLENGE SUCCESS



A Level Maths and Further Maths students took part in the UK Mathematics Trust Senior Maths Challenge.

This year, more students than ever participated, with 40 students across both years putting their problem-solving and logical thinking skills to the test.

Of those who entered, 14 achieved a bronze certificate, 10 achieved silver and, in our best year ever, 6 secured gold. Those achieving gold have qualified for the follow-on round, the Senior Kangaroo, where participants will face even more challenging problems.



ADAM WINS PRESTIGIOUS GOLD BTEC LEARNER OF THE YEAR AWARD

The remarkable accomplishments of Level 3 IT BTEC Diploma student Adam Davey were celebrated as he was awarded the prestigious Gold BTEC Award for IT and Computing Learner of the Year at the BTEC Awards 2022 in London.

Adam's inspiring achievements stood out among an international field of candidates and wowed the judges, who felt it was his ability to go above and beyond expectations that impressed the judges so enormously. Not only is Adam the first and last to ask and answer questions – which he always absorbs immediately - but his commitment to producing high quality work, despite the challenging material or his incredibly busy schedule, is what sets him apart.

During his time at Callywith, Adam, who is now studying Games Development Programming at Falmouth University, combined his knowledge of IT with leadership skills, resulting in impressive team challenge results. It's his ability to grow and take new challenges by the scruff of the neck that will help him continue to stand out in his fledgling university career.

Adam's IT Lecturer Jim Stoneleigh said: "My colleagues and I are delighted for Adam. He is a dedicated, extremely hard-working student and is a role model and inspiration to other students. The BTEC IT and Computing Learner of the Year Gold Award is a remarkable accolade, and we are thrilled that Adam has won it and that Callywith College, along with others, were able to help him achieve this award."

Games, Animation & VFX Skills Diploma student Ellie Smith, has recently been announced as a finalist within this year's BAFTA Young Game Designers Awards.

Young Game Designers is an initiative by BAFTA that inspires and supports young people to create, develop and present their new game idea to the world.

Ellie's game concept, 'Escape the Engines' is a Steampunk escape room party game, with the only means of escape being through the players' abilities to communicate and work together before the time runs out. Players are placed in their own Steampunk stylised room, which they need to escape from before the time runs out.

However, these rooms interact with one another, meaning the players will need to communicate in real life and work together to solve challenging puzzles and beat the engines.

Ellie shared: "I'm so thrilled to be a finalist because it means I get to meet industry leaders and receive personal advice and guidance from experts.

"I decided to enter the competition because it was an opportunity to challenge my skills. I love that there is so much freedom in terms of career options/lifestyle in games design and the fact that any outside knowledge, interests or random hobbies could transfer into a great idea for a game.

"In the future, I hope to continue developing my skills/knowledge so I can build my career in the industry and contribute to a variety of popular games."

ASPIRING PILOT RECEIVES AWARD AT ROYAL AERONAUTICAL SOCIETY



Level 3 IT Diploma student Grace Cartwright received an award at The Air League Scholarship Awards Reception at the Royal Aeronautical Society in London.

Following Grace's Air Cadet Pilot Scholarship (ACPS), which she completed in Dundee in April this year, Grace subsequently applied to the Air League – the UK's leading aviation and aerospace charity with a vision focused on changing lives through aviation. The charity aims to break down barriers into these industries through its scholarship and outreach programmes. Grace was awarded a further scholarship - the Ed Strongman Flying Scholarship and travelled to Dundee for flying training in September.

The Cup was established in 2008 in memory of Evelyn 'Evie' Florence Saunders, a remarkable lady who stretched the boundaries for female aviators in her generation. A Piper aeroplane (PA-28 G-Evie) was donated to Tayside Aviation in Dundee to run scholarships on behalf of the Air League Trust in her memory.

Grace shared: "I feel so honoured to have been named the recipient of the Evelyn Saunders Memorial cup, and feel that this and the scholarship itself will now open so many more doors to me when it comes to my career in the future."

PROTECTIVE SERVICES STUDENTS EXPERIENCE DAY IN THE LIFE OF A FIREFIGHTER

Bodmin Community Fire Station hosted Level 3 Uniformed Protective Services Diploma students for a brilliant Fire & Rescue Service Insight Day.



The day began with an in-depth presentation on all the different equipment used by firefighters, which was interrupted by a real-life call out, allowing students to watch the speed and effectiveness of their response. Luckily, students were left in the capable hands of two trainee police officers and two firefighters, to continue their experience.

The day continued with students all donning firefighter clothing including helmets. The students also had the opportunity to participate in the FireFit annual test that all Firefighters must pass. This included hose runs, equipment carries, dummy drags and sprinting.

The crew returned from their call out and students began their breathing apparatus drills, carrying out searches in a replica two-story house damaged by fire and searching for casualties in the dark.



The final experience involved four willing volunteers sitting in a car that was made to replicate a crash. The firefighters demonstrated the crash equipment to cut them free.

MEDICS' ACADEMY STUDENTS VISITED BY THE ARMY


These are just some of the responses students have been sharing on our aspirations graffiti wall in Garrow building.

CALLYWITH ALUMNI SHARE THEIR UNI EXPERIENCES

2021 student leavers were welcomed back to the College to talk to current Academic Academy students about their university experiences - from applying and living away from home for the first time to making friends and studying at university.


The students shared their varied and rich experiences of university.

Rhys Metcalfe, who studied A Level History, Law and Politics at Callywith and is now studying History with German at Portsmouth University, spoke about applying and deciding which university to choose. Rhys shared: "If you can, go and visit the unis and look at the halls, as that's where you'll most likely be living if you decide to go there."

Rhys, who previously attended Poltair School, also shared his top financial tips including opening a student bank account, getting a student railcard, applying for student finance, as well as other discounts and money savings you can make as a student.

Former A Level History, Law, Politics and Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) student Jack Pomeroy, talked about his decision to leave his Law, Criminology and Criminal Justice course at Plymouth University - where he lived at home in Cornwall to save money - to reapply to study Law at Bristol UWE. The long commutes, 5am wakeups and finding time for all student activities, led to Jack reevaluating his university choices. To achieve this, he went back to his tutor at Callywith, Jonny, who helped him to reapply and to get to where he really wanted to be.

Jack, who previously attended Penrice Academy, shared his advice with students: "Try to be 100% on your decision to go to uni, I know that's not a guarantee, because you'll chop and change what you want to do all the time. But make sure if you want to go to uni, stick with it, because there are financial implications if you interrupt your studies like I did. Also, speak to everyone for advice; your tutors, parents, whoever you want, as they're the best to speak to about it."



Former A Level Biology, Chemistry, Psychology and Medics' Academy student Riley Griffiths, spoke to students about her experiences of studying Medicine at Exeter University.

Riley, who previously attended Looe Community Academy, spoke about how despite not being able to visit the university before applying due to covid lockdown, she is happy with her decision to go to Exeter University. Riley took students through a week in the life of a medical student, from mornings in university halls, living with several people and navigating a shared bathroom to lectures and studying with other students. She also spoke about workshops she has participated in, getting practical experience of dissections, and even working at Exeter Hospital practicing clinical skills such as injections and how to examine people.



Former A Level students Maddy-Hose and Archie share their experience at Cambridge University University has loads of different aspects to it. There is, of course, the academic side but uni is also a very important time for your personal development.

Riley spoke about how there are a lot of things to do in a medical student's week, as well as a lot of free time, which she takes advantage of including being an active netball player, as well as being active in other Exeter University student societies, meaning that there is always something to do.

Riley shared how applying to study medicine is a bit different to other course applications: "I had to write a personal statement explaining why you want to be a medic and what skills you have that'd make you a good doctor, which I had to do by October. I also had to do a UCAT logic test." She also recommended students intent on studying Medicine attend



the Medics' Academy; "as they'll help you understand all of the stages of applying, as well as support you through them."

Former A Level Law, Business and Psychology student Alfie Branch, who is now studying Law at Cardiff University, shared how he originally applied for a degree in paramedic science, but after close re-examination of his skills, realised that he wanted to do something else. Unfortunately, at this time, his UCAS application had already been sent in and offers for interviews to study paramedic science were already coming through.

Riley shared how applying to study medicine is different to other course applications. Alfie, who previously attended Launceston College, shared how he felt at this time: "So, of course I had a meltdown, thought the world was going to end, and that I was completely screwed. But with the help of my amazing lecturers here at Callywith and many, many phone calls with UCAS, I was able to figure out what my next steps were."

This is where Alfie found out about UCAS Extra, a new service offered by UCAS which allowed him to withdraw from all his chosen universities and add an extra university in February, when he applied to study Law at Cardiff University. Alfie worked closely with his Callywith Law Lecturer and his personal tutor to make sure his grades met the entry requirements, as well as recrafting his personal statement. He was very excited to learn, a few weeks later, that he had received a conditional offer from Cardiff.

Alfie shared: "Over the next 6 months, I had finished my studies at Callywith. I enjoyed my summer break after 2 very strange years as a student, and when results day came, I found I had got the grades I needed. The past few months at Cardiff Uni have been some of the best of my life. University has loads and loads of different aspects to it, there is of course the academic side of things, but uni is also a very important time for your personal development. For many of you, it will be the first time moving away from home, and it comes with many hurdles, I remember moving knowing hardly anything; how to cook or do laundry. But you will learn how to become selfsufficient and get the first taste of adulthood. It's very daunting but all of your friends and flatmates will be in the same position as you, so don't feel alone."

Finally, Archie McNamara and Maddy-Rose Hunter spoke about their time at Cambridge University. Being in a minority of Cornish students who didn't go to private school, they found common ground with each other and became friends.

Archie, who studied A Level Chemistry, Physics, Maths and Further Maths and attended the Academic Academy at Callywith, is now studying Natural Sciences (Physical) at Cambridge and Maddy-Rose, who studied A Level History, Biology, English Literature and Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), now studies History.

Archie, who previously attended Wadebridge School and Maddy-Rose, who previously attended Fowey River Academy, spoke about life at Cambridge, the Colleges they attend and the importance of staying healthy whilst at university. They also gave Callywith students some excellent tips for thriving in your first term: "Don't stay in your room all the time, even though it's really easy if all your lectures are online. And I only shopped every two weeks, and I ended up with just bagels and butter for meals," Maddy-Rose said.

They also told students about some of the societies and extra-curricular clubs Cambridge has to offer including the Cambridge Union, where you can debate high-ranking politicians, celebrities, and other important figures.

At the end of the talk, former students held a Q&A with current Callywith students about the application process, writing personal statements, attending interviews and how to use the College's resources to get the best chance of getting into the uni of their dreams.



CALLYWITH'S EXCEPTIONAL STUDENTS ACHIEVE OUTSTANDING RESULTS

Hundreds of Callywith College's A Level and Extended Diploma students celebrated as they bucked national trends to achieve high grades and secure outstanding progression opportunities.

The 215 A Level students receiving results at the College collectively secured a 99.4% pass rate, with 72% of entries being awarded A*-B grades; 10% higher than national averages for 2022.

Students studying Level 3 Extended Diploma and Diploma courses have also achieved excellent results. With 106 (43%) of the College's cohort of 245 students passing, with the top distinction grades or higher.

Callywith College Principal Jon Grey said: "Amongst all the coverage of government's demands to "clamp down on grade inflation" following the cancellation of exams over the previous two years due to covid – that is certainly not the case for the students of Callywith College. Results obtained this year have far exceeded the exceptional results achieved by our last cohort of examined students in 2019 ahead of our outstanding Ofsted rating in 2020.

"The vast majority of our university applicants have successfully gained entry to their first-choice institutions. Across the College, we have so many great success stories and I'd like to congratulate all of our students on what they have achieved and urge them to keep in touch with the College to let us know how their next steps into employment, apprenticeship or university are going."





Here are just some of the outstanding success stories:

Georgia Stevens, who was offered a place at Oxford University to study Law, achieved four A*s in Law, History and Geography A Levels and an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ). Georgia, who previously attended Holsworthy Community College, shared: "I'm very happy about my results, it feels so amazing to be rewarded for all the hard work I put in.

"The teachers at Callywith have all been so supportive in pushing me to achieve my full potential. They believed in me and encouraged me to aim high."

Tommy Japes, who previously attended Launceston College, achieved four A*s in Biology, Chemistry and Maths A Levels and an EPQ. Tommy, who also attended the Medics' Academy at Callywith and was offered a place at Barts and The London School of Medicine and Dentistry to study Medicine, shared: "I feel so relieved to get my results and proud of myself. Callywith has been an excellent stepping-stone for me between school and university. It is a great environment to learn in.

"I have felt fully supported by all my lecturers, in particular my tutor. It has been a tough year for me at times and she has always been there for me."

Callywith College secures almost £20,000 in grant funding to help develop physical activity opportunities at the College.

Sport England's 'Queen's Platinum Jubilee Activity Fund' has funded the College £10,000 to create an outdoor mindfulness exercise trail which will be situated in the grounds. The trail will include outdoor fitness equipment situated at various locations in-between specifically designed trees, flora and fauna and will be designed to create a safe journey through nature to help students and staff become more active and improve their mental health.

A further £8,000 has been secured through the 'Children in Need' fund to help the Health, Wellbeing and Sport (HWS) programme to continue working with Student Services to provide opportunities and interventions for young people with mental health challenges by offering support to develop physical activity strategies to help cope with stress and anxiety.

Former A Level student Issac Cude who benefited from the Children in Need fund shared: "I was quite anxious and stressed to start my A Levels and quite low and insecure as a person and I found it very difficult to get to grips with who I was as person."

"In the College gym, I felt relaxed and good about myself, because I'm looking after myself. It's also about going there to feel positive, that you've pushed yourself, that you've tried, setting yourself goals and mentally achieving them."

"The College has given me the encouragement to actively look after myself and I feel like I'm taking responsibility for myself as a person and that's something I would have likely ignored last year. Children in Need are helping people in a really difficult situation, it's helping us with our development, with confidence and self-identity, it's just brilliant."

The College offer a full timetable of sport academies and physical activities for students and staff including football, rugby, basketball, netball, table tennis, badminton, as well as fitness and strength and conditioning sessions in a fully-equipped gym in the Fox Building.

Look at all of your options

Consider whether you want to do A Levels - a great route if you want to keep your options open. Or if you know the area of study or career you wish to pursue, you can specialise in a Diploma.



Think about your future

If you're thinking about university and have a degree in mind already, then take a look at the degree entry requirements. Some degree courses require specific subjects to be studied, visit www.ucas.com to check. A potential career goal could also lead you to pick subjects relating to that job you have in mind.





Choose subjects you'll enjoy

If you're completely stuck for ideas on which courses to pick, then think about the subjects you enjoy at school. Exploring your favourite school subject further at college could make you love it even more and open up a path for your future when it comes to your career.



Look at entry requirements

When choosing your courses, make sure you take a look at the entry requirements for the A Levels, or Diploma you are thinking of choosing. In the Callywith prospectus, the 'What to choose' section on pages 30-31, will give you more information on this.



Write a list

Once you've had a think about all of your options, write them down in a list so they are easier to weigh up. Organising your thoughts on paper will most likely make a lot more sense and you can always come back later to reflect.



Do your research

Research is key when choosing your courses. Read the prospectus and course content on the Callywith website and attend open events at the College to talk to the staff teaching the subjects you're interested in. Look in detail at what you'll be studying and find out the type of assessments that are involved to determine which courses will suit you.



Your A Level choices don't have to be similar

If you've decided to go down the route of A Levels, they don't have to be linked to each other. Studying a variety of subjects will keep your options open for your future if you are undecided. However, if you do have a particular degree or career in mind, then choosing similar subjects, all science related for example, or studying a specific Diploma, is not a problem either. Most combinations are possible.



What if I don't like the course I've picked?

Don't panic if you start the course in September and think you've made the wrong decision. Talk to your teacher and you may be able to change your options. They are always going to have your best interests in mind and will encourage you to do what you think is best for you. Just remember to speak up.





Don't just choose what your friends are doing

Don't choose a course just because your friend is doing it. You're choosing for your own personal benefit. Going into a new classroom not knowing anyone might be daunting, but just remember that others are in the same boat as you. You'll make new friends on your course and can always meet up with your old friends at lunch time.



Get more advice

If you're still struggling to decide, organise a meeting with the careers advisor at your school for more help, or visit the College on an open day to talk to subject staff. You will also have the opportunity to discuss your options at your admissions interview to help you decide on your course choices.
