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EXCEPTIONAL STUDENTS ACHIEVE OUTSTANDING RESULTS


Hundreds of Callywith College's A Level and Extended Diploma students celebrate achieving excellent results and securing outstanding progression opportunities.

The 236 A Level students receiving results at the College have collectively secured a 99% pass rate, with 56% of entries being awarded A*-B grades; 3% higher than national averages for 2023.

Students studying Level 3 Extended Diploma and Diploma courses have also achieved excellent results, with 95 (45%) of the College's cohort of 212 students passing with the top distinction grades or higher.

Callywith College Assistant Principal Allyn Jefferies said: "We are very proud of the results achieved by our students and it is a huge endorsement of the dedication shown by students and staff at the College.



MOST SUCCESSFUL RESULTS YET IN CHEMISTRY CHALLENGE



The annual chemistry competition, organised by St. Catherine's College, Cambridge, consists of a ninety-minute written paper based on current chemistry issues, such as environmental chemistry, medicine manufacture and fuel composition.

This year, the majority of Callywith entrants achieved awards. One of our top-achieving students in the competition, Corben Jones, took home Callywith's first ever Gold award. Corben is looking to use his skills to study biochemistry at university.

The top prize was secured by an amazing performance from Dylan Cooper-Waite, who was awarded the Roentgenium award, a brilliant result achieved only by the top 0.6% of entries. In addition to the award, Dylan was invited to a summer training camp at St. Catherine's College, Cambridge. He is hoping to pursue medicine as a career and is working extremely hard to achieve his ambitions.

FUTURE POLICE OFFICERS ENJOY WORK EXPERIENCE WFFK

Devon & Cornwall Police recently held a fantastic Work Experience Week at Callywith for 30 Year 12 students from across Cornwall including Callywith Level 3 Uniformed Protective Services Diploma students.







The week compromised of several presentations, practical learning opportunities, and guest speakers covering the many different aspects of policing in the modern world. Students learnt about career opportunities within policing, as well as the practical and detailed workings of the job.

Students were rewarded with an amazing insight as to whether policing is the career for them. First year Protective Services student Rosa Dubare said: "It was very interesting to see all the different roles and careers you could undertake in the police and how they all come together to work as a big team. My favourite part of the week was learning self-defence skills and how to restrain people."

Week' was particularly helpful.


"After university I hope to join the Navy and work as a diplomatic relations and warfare officer."

The students also benefitted from a personal statement and interview workshop session delivered by Downing College, Cambridge.

Callywith student Jack Thompson, who went on the trip shared: "Going to Oxford and Cambridge was a unique experience that really opened my eyes to the many opportunities that not just Oxbridge but universities in general can bring. Students studying the Level 3 Art & Design Diploma and A Level Art courses were recently visited by Artist Abigail Reynolds.


Students attended an informative and inspirational talk in the lecture theatre, followed by a Q&A and some brilliant workshops where Abigail shared her creative processes with students and how they can replicate this in their own work.

Reynolds, who lives in St Just, Cornwall, uses montage techniques of layering and folding to destabilise singular ideas of cultural and political ecologies. She works across sculpture, print and film as well as creating events to bring disparate things into conversation.

Art & Design Diploma student Betty Sellars-Page shared: "Abigail Reynolds' talk was very inspirational. Being able to listen to an artist who is so enthusiastic about her work was amazing to listen to. I really enjoyed being able to hear her passion for art and share that feeling with her." A Level Fine Art student Erin Archibald shared: "I found it really interesting to learn methods of creating art that I hadn't thought of before. I loved listening to her talk about her work, you could tell she is very passionate and invested. The workshop introduced me to using space and lines in more practical and abstract ways."

A Level Art History: Critical & Contextual Studies student Alice Goodman shared: "The workshop gave really good insight into how her process works, and it was inspiring to be able to use her technique to make something my own. Level 3 Photography Diploma student Kodai Benjamin selected for Origins Creatives 2023 by University of the Arts London (UAL).





Origins Creatives, organised by UAL Awarding Body, offered students the exciting opportunity to see their work exhibited at the Truman Brewery, Shoreditch, London on 21-23 July.

Kodai's submission 'Kurashi Magazine' caught the attention of UAL Awarding Body's curator amongst 400 entries from colleges nationwide.

Kurashi is a 72-page sustainable lifestyle magazine that explores the work of artisans and creatives predominately in the South West of England. Kodai is passionate about sustainable food and fashion and has used his final major project as an opportunity to combine them. The magazine features interviews with a visual artist who uses mixed media to capture the feel and essence of landscapes, and a sustainable clothes designer based in Devon, who places sustainability at the core of her practice. There is also a feature which 'scratches the surface of artisan retail in Bristol' and a photo journal exploring Copenhagen.

Kurashi started as a photography project which Kodai developed to explore graphic design and magazine production. Kodai's lifestyle photography skilfully incorporates elements of landscape, portrait and



documentary photography to create an informative and sophisticated magazine.

Origins Creatives provides art lovers, critics and industry professionals from the creative sector the chance to discover original creative talent from across the UK and celebrate students' creativity and hard work.

The free exhibition, showcased work from some of the UK's most talented students in Further Education institutions studying across the UAL subject areas of Art and Design, Fashion, Business and Retail, Creative Media, Music Performance and Production and Performing Arts.

The exhibition showcased selected work created by students from Levels 1, 2, 3 and 4 across all subject areas and included a diverse range of painting, photography, drawing, sculpture, fashion and more.

CHOOSING THE RIGHT COLLEGE COURSE FOR YOU

Choosing what courses to study at college can be tough, especially when there's so many on offer, so here are some tips and advice to help make this decision seem less daunting.



Look at all of your options

Make sure you look at all that's on offer and then look at the courses that initially attract your attention in more detail in the Callywith prospectus and at callywith.ac.uk. Consider whether you want to do A Levels - a great route if you want to keep your options open. Or if you know the area of study or career you wish to pursue, you can specialise in a Diploma.



Think about your future

If you're thinking about university and have a degree in mind already, then take a look at the degree entry requirements. Some degree courses require specific subjects to be studied, visit ucas.com to check. A potential career goal could also lead you to pick subjects relating to that job you have in mind.





Choose subjects you'll enjoy

If you're completely stuck for ideas on which courses to pick, then think about the subjects you enjoy at school. Exploring your favourite school subject further at college could make you love it even more and open up a path for your future when it comes to your career.



Look at entry requirements

When choosing your courses, make sure you take a look at the entry requirements for the A Levels, or Diploma you are thinking of choosing. In the Callywith prospectus, the 'What to choose' section on pages 30-31, will give you more information on this.



Write a list

Once you've had a think about all of your options, write them down in a list so they are easier to weigh up. Organising your thoughts on paper will most likely make a lot more sense and you can always come back later to reflect.



Do your research

Research is key when choosing your courses. Read the prospectus and course content on the Callywith website and attend open events at the College to talk to the staff teaching the subjects you're interested in. Look in detail at what you'll be studying and find out the type of assessments that are involved to determine which courses will suit you.



Your A Level choices don't have to be similar

If you've decided to go down the route of A Levels, they don't have to be linked to each other. Studying a variety of subjects will keep your options open for your future if you are undecided. However, if you do have a particular degree or career in mind, then choosing similar subjects, all science related for example, or studying a specific Diploma, is not a problem either. Most combinations are possible.



What if I don't like the course I've picked?

Don't panic if you start the course in September and think you've made the wrong decision. Talk to your teacher and you may be able to change your options. They are always going to have your best interests in mind and will encourage you to do what you think is best for you. Just remember to speak up.






Don't just choose what your friends are doing

Don't choose a course just because your friend is doing it. You're choosing for your own personal benefit. Going into a new classroom not knowing anyone might be daunting, but just remember that others are in the same boat as you. You'll make new friends on your course and can always meet up with your old friends at lunch time.



Get more advice

If you're still struggling to decide, organise a meeting with the careers advisor at your school for more help, or visit the College on an open day to talk to subject staff. You will also have the opportunity to discuss your options at your admissions interview to help you decide on your course choices.



Students have had some incredible experiences including a visit to the world-renowned Blue Lagoon geothermal spa and a recent lava flow on the Reykjanes Peninsula, ice hiking to the top of the Solheimajökull glacier using crampons and ice axes, as well as visiting the LAVA Centre exhibition and local geothermal pools.

Students also visited the Seljalandsfoss and Skógafoss waterfalls, the famous site of Geysir and the tectonic rift valley of Thingvellir.

At the end of the trip, students had the chance to explore the historic centre of Reykjavik.

Callywith Geography student Tamsin said: "It was an incredible trip! Nothing like we were expecting and it was so many levels above what we had prepared for. Being able to do so many amazing activities in such a small amount of time and still being able to appreciate Iceland's beauty, made it so worthwhile." Fellow Geography student Bob said: "I can't think of words to describe how fun it was. Simply an amazing experience! Thanks so much to everyone who was involved in the arrangement and execution!"

Callywith Geography Lecturer Matt Andrews shared: "It was amazing to restart our annual trip to Iceland. Students got to see Iceland's Arctic tundra in a frozen state with some short blizzards interspersing the overall glorious sunshine and clear days. We were able to visit many of the tectonic sites around Iceland's tectonic rift valley, which this year included a walk up to the recent (2021) lava flow of Fagradalsfjall. Our glacier hike was a great success, with all students making it right up onto the top of the Sólheimajökull glacier. All the students were amazing ambassadors for Geography and even learnt some Icelandic - jajae!"





Callywith students had a brilliant half term on the slopes of Pontedilegno-Tonale, Italy with students from Truro and Penwith College.



It was fantastic to see students enjoying the mountains once again and mixing and making new friends from across all three campuses.

All students made amazing progress during the week-long trip, many of which who had never skied or snowboarded before! Students tackled slopes at the Presena Glacier (3,000m above sea level) with the help of their excellent instructors Giuseppe, Osvaldo, Daniele and Stefano at Ponte di Legno Ski School.

Our advanced ski groups skied a wide range of different pistes across the 319 run resort. Students were treated to 'bluebird' ski days throughout the week as the conditions were perfect.

The Truro, Penwith and Callywith (TPC) Ski Club team were thoroughly impressed with the attitude and amazing progression of all students.



PRUTECTIVE SERVICES STUDENTS TAKE PART IN 'THE GREAT TOMMY SLEEP OUT'

Level 3 Uniformed Protective Services Diploma students swapped their beds for sleeping bags to take part in 'The Great Tommy Sleep Out' challenge to raise funds and awareness for over 6000 veterans that are experiencing homeless in the UK right now.

Callywith Protective Services Lecturer Matt Kennedy-Smith said: "The students really enjoyed this experience; cooking meals on Trangias before bed, then sleeping under canvas on a beautiful, clear, starry night - although the temperature did drop considerably around 3am.

"This is the students' third charity raising event, helping them realise the value of being an active citizen and how it benefits them in joining the protective services. It has also helped students to develop their skills for their forthcoming Gold Duke of Edinburgh expeditions, which is part of the course."

The students raised a fantastic £425 of their £500 target!

With every penny raised, Royal British Legion Industries (RBLI) can provide safe, warm housing and ensure everyone has a fair opportunity to gain employment, regardless of health conditions or disability.

Students have previously raised money for Cancer Research UK by doing 100 press-ups every day for the month of February and for Royal British Legion by selling poppies around college, raising a total of $\mathfrak{L}1,136$.

HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE CAREERS DAY

Health and Social Care professionals from all over Devon and Cornwall came to Callywith to deliver sessions to share their experiences working in the sector with Health and Social Care students.





Guest speakers included a speech and language therapist, education lead pharmacist, lead dietitian, children and adults eating disorder services, bariatric dietitian, lead podiatrist and AHP professional, Sanctuary Care, Proud To Care Cornwall, Royal Cornwall Hospitals Trust and Cornwall Partnership NHS Foundation Trust. Students engaged in activities such as quizzes, a problem-solving task, physical activities (hand grip diameter) and tasting dietary supplements and meal replacement drinks. Students were also introduced and engaged with a lovely resident from St Breock Care Home in Wadebridge who provided experience about living in a care home and what the care assistants do to support her daily.

All sessions covered career progressions including apprenticeships routes, a day in the life and additional work experience opportunities that have been opened for our students.



HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE STUDENTS' HEART DISSECTION

Level 3 Health and Social Care Diploma students had their first session in the science labs participating in a heart dissection. This was to help prepare students for their Unit 3 - Anatomy and Physiology exam.

Students have been learning about the cardiovascular system, consisting of the heart, blood vessels, cardiac cycle and disorders. They were able to identify the structure of the heart and label correctly.

An excellent opportunity for students to get involved in, understand laboratory health and safety and apply theory to practical situations.



HANNAH ACHIEVES DREAM OF BECOMING PARAMEDIC

Hannah, who previously attended Budehaven Community School shared how she is feeling to have graduated: "I feel like I have finally accomplished my end goal of becoming a qualified paramedic. It feels surreal now going into the world of full time employment within the NHS and away from my normal study routine so I think that will definitely take some getting used to!!

"I thoroughly enjoyed university, I was able to meet lots of new people and gain a new sense of independence. I participated in the netball society which enabled me to carry on netball after college. My degree involved 50% placement which gave me great practical experience and a different side to learning.

"All my experiences at Callywith set me up for university, I thoroughly enjoyed my time at college. My tutor and other teachers at Callywith helped me understand the UCAS process, and the importance of university open days. My tutor would prepare questions and I would participate in 'mock' interviews which benefited me when it came down to the actual interviews and I genuinely believe this helped me get 5/5 university offers.



"I am now employed by the South Western Ambulance Service as a frontline Paramedic working in the North Devon Area. At the moment, I hope to find my feet and settle into the job, get to know all my colleagues and enjoy being qualified. I hope in the future to complete a Masters to further my knowledge and allow me to progress into advanced rolls within the NHS. I am currently completing a month volunteering in Nepal alongside other Paramedics. We are working within schools, hospitals and the Nepal Ambulance Service in order to improve education and global health. I have been teaching children and their communities about how to use basic everyday objects as medical aids such as cardboard and bamboo. I have so far really enjoyed this type of work and hope to continue to do something similar in the future.

Former A Level Biology, PE and Psychology student Hannah Harrington-Hardy, who has recently graduated from University of Plymouth with a 1st class honours in Paramedic Science, begins her dream career as a qualified Paramedic for the NHS.

"My advice to anyone who is interested in becoming a Paramedic is to know there are two routes: the university route where you study BsC (Hons) Paramedic Science for 3 years or you can join the ambulance service as an ECA (emergency care assistant) and you can complete an internal apprenticeship after 2 years to become a paramedic. Both routes are excellent it just depends what fits yours lifestyle.

"I would also say, gain as much healthcare/ social experience as you can (such as a residential home) to understand if shift work and the medical field is for you. And go for it!! It's a rewarding job that constantly keeps you on your toes everyday."

LIFE-CHANGING EXPERIENCE

A Level Geography students and staff from Callywith, Truro and Penwith Colleges were extraordinarily grateful to have been able to return to the kingdom of Eswatini in southern Africa to visit the community of Shewula.

For over 20 years, Truro & Penwith College's Shewula Orphans' Fund charity has aided economic development and sponsored 100s of Shewula children to complete their schooling.

After a four-year break due to Covid-19, the annual college trips were greeted with huge warmth by the community, who expressed their deep gratitude for the continued support of our students and their families. Shewula remains in a fragile stage of development, not least due to the continued impact of the HIV epidemic which has left a 20% infection rate in the area, as well as hundreds of orphaned children.

During the trips, our students complete valuable work with the young people of Shewula and make connections with the community that strengthen the ongoing bonds of friendship between us. They also have the opportunity to spend a few days at the end of the trip to explore and experience the diverse and beautiful culture, landscape and wildlife of Eswatini.

Students have reflected thoughtfully on their first-hand experience of the challenges of development in sub-Saharan Africa and the impacts of globalisation, and, as ever, students have returned with a sense of renewed dedication to supporting the community of Shewula to thrive.







Callywith A Level Geography student Emilia Poet shared: "I had the most amazing time! It's a trip that I will never forget. Seeing the College's links with the charity in Shewula was inspiring. Taking toys and clothes and playing with the children was so fun and everyone within the community was so welcoming. Much fun was had on safari, zip wiring, cooking and joining in with plenty of traditional dancing! I feel very lucky to have had this opportunity."

Fellow Callywith student Emma Bersey said: "The trip was an eye-opening experience into real problems which are still faced today which feel like a different world away.

"It was a very fulfilling experience seeing how much joy we brought to the children through playing with them and giving them the toys and clothes. The experience has made me more independent and confident as a person (my mum and dad said they have noticed a difference) and I've definitely made friends for life on the trip."

Eliza Thomas-Hegarty shared: "Whilst the trip showed how much our help has impacted communities like Shewula, it was an eye opener to how much more needs to be achieved. You will form so many new friendships with both the community and each other, and learn a lot about your own strength."

ALUMNI SHARE THEIR UNIVERSITY EXPERIENCES

We recently welcomed back some of our wonderful former students to our Academic Academy to talk to current students about their university experiences - from applying and choosing a university to living away from home and balancing studies with social life.

Former A Level Law, History, Geography and Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) student Georgia Stevens, who is now a first year Law student at Oxford University, shared how the application process for Oxbridge (Oxford and Cambridge universities) is different to other universities: "One of the perks of applying to Oxbridge is you have to submit your UCAS application earlier, which means that you can get it out the way and don't have to worry about it. Most people will attend 2-3 interviews and then there are also admissions tests."

Georgia, who previously attended Holsworthy Community College, shared how the College have helped her throughout her application: "There's a lot of support at Callywith with applying to Oxbridge including setting up mock interviews, which definitely helped. I spoke to some lawyers and some barristers, and they grilled me which is great because you need it!"

Georgia also spoke about the differences in teaching at Oxford and other universities: "When studying law, you are not taught in lectures. You're mainly taught in tutorials with a tutor partner and a professor. It can be quite scary, but it's so good, because you get to chat one-on-one with professors who are the biggest names in the field, which I think is really great, you're not going to get teaching like it anywhere else.

"There's also a lot of financial support at Oxford, which I think is something to bear in mind. They are quite generous with their bursaries and scholarships, so try not to worry about finances if that's something you're concerned about."

Georgia also shared her advice for those considering applying: "Definitely try not to be scared by Oxbridge, anybody can do it, I was scared about being from a rural area, the first one in my family to go to university, having never been to private school or anything like that, but it's definitely not what you think it is, you're not surrounded by posh people all the time. It can be really good and I meet a lot of people like me.

"I would definitely recommend applying if you can, because you've got nothing to lose!"



Former A Level Law, Business and Psychology student Alfie Branch, who is now in his second year studying Law at Cardiff University, shared how he originally applied for a degree in paramedic science, but later decided he wanted to study law: "With the help of my amazing lecturers at Callywith and many phone calls with UCAS, I discovered UCAS Extra which allowed me to withdraw from all my chosen universities and add an extra university in February, when I applied to study Law at Cardiff University."

Alfie, who previously attended Launceston College, shared his experiences at university so far: "Moving to Cardiff was super exciting but one of the most nerve-wracking things I've ever done. For me and probably for most of you here, it was the first time moving away from home, living alone, having to cook, wash, be an adult for the first time. But I met my flatmates, and they were just lovely.

"The first few months of uni were very different to college, what you get is what you give at uni; you have to put in what you want

Former BTEC Level 3 Business Diploma student Angeline Toledo, who previously attended Launceston College and is now in her second year studying Business and Digital Marketing at Falmouth University, shared some helpful tips: "In your first year, you're definitely very nervous and then you sort of start to get used to things. My top tip is definitely to go to open days, not only to get a better feel for the uni, but also a feel for the location.

"Also, don't stress about whether you're going to get your chosen accommodation because at the end of the day you're only living there for less than a year and you're going to be in the same position as everyone else. I made friends with people in my flat very quickly. You'll make friends with your course mates as well.

"I think one thing that's really important to remember is to always ask for help, no matter how stupid you think the question is, your lecturers are there to support you all the way. They're not there to give you a hard time, they want you to be comfortable and they want to see you succeed." to get back. You'll get the balance of your social life, your free time and your studies. I also got a job as a bartender, I'm someone who likes to stay busy and having that extra bit of money come in is always helpful and you meet even more people who don't go to uni or do different courses.

Former A Level History, English Literature, Philosophy and EPQ student Cerys Chadd, who is now in her second year studying Ancient History at Durham University, shared how she came to choose Durham: "Choosing a university is a very important decision, distance and location is something you have to consider. I was a bit scared of going to a big city, but you can find other places like Cornwall. For me, Durham is a great location; 20 mins by bus to the beach and 10 mins by train into Newcastle. Even though it's far away, it's not a big city, not everywhere out of Cornwall is going to be a massive city and really daunting.

"Also, you may want to go where your friends are, but don't make that your deciding factor because you're going to make friends while you're there. Definitely look at open days, you get to look around but it's also a way to make friends, so if you're nervous about going to university, you've got some people you already know."

"This year, I also took on pro bono (volunteering in law) and I am a team leader of a Support Through Court (STC) group providing legal advice to litigants – individuals who are going through the court system without legal representation, providing support by helping them to fill out forms and finding a solicitor.

"I also joined the Fitness and Dance Society. Joining a society is one of the most beneficial things you can do. It gives you a break from your degree and you're meeting so many people from different courses and different years.

"Whilst at uni, you'll also have to learn how to structure yourself financially; weekly food shops and circuit laundry. Luckily for me, Cardiff is a very cheap student city.

"Uni is a time to discover yourself, figure out who you want to be, where you want to go in life. Always say yes to opportunities if you can. I've met some of my best friends at the most unexpected events!"



Cerys Chadd - Ancient History, Durham University

Cerys, who previously attended Wadebridge School, also spoke about other opportunities she is involved in at university including lacrosse and the Arts Society where she was involved with organising the annual ball and arts week, which she found was a great way to make friends and learn new skills.

Cerys' advice to students is to find balance with their studying: "I think I didn't have the balance quite right in the first year, but that's something you learn, so don't worry if you don't think you're doing enough or doing too much, you'll find your way. In your first year, you'll want to establish a routine, like how you study and the best way to revise. My tip would be to start essays early and don't leave them until the night before!"
