

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At the end of another challenging year that ended with no external exams due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Callywith College's A Level and **Extended Diploma students** celebrated achieving another set of exceptional results and earning outstanding

exceptional results



progression opportunities.

Archie McNamara achieved A*A*A* in Maths, Further Maths, Chemistry & Physics A Levels.

Following the government's decision that the Summer 2021 examination series would not go ahead, Callywith College followed national guidance in submitting teacher assessed grades to exam boards determined by teachers, based upon a range of evidence and reflecting their performance.

A Level students at the College collectively secured a 99.9% pass rate overall, with 92.5% of entries being awarded A*-C grades.

Students studying Level 3 Extended Diploma and Diploma courses also achieved excellent results. 100% of the College's cohort of over 250 students passed, with 121 (46%) achieving the top distinction grades or higher.

Callywith College Principal Jon Grey said: "We are so proud of the achievements of all of our students with exam grades being just one part of their development. The way staff and students have responded to continuing challenges presented by COVID-19 again this year has been truly remarkable. Our students have shown real

resilience, determination and strength to pursue their ambitions and should be proud of their achievements.

"The vast majority of our UCAS applicants have successfully gained entry to their first-choice institutions and it is a privilege to share their pride in these achievements and the excitement they have for their futures. There will be a lot of talk about "grade inflation" today, but it is the individual success stories that really matter. Students and their teachers have done their absolute best and worked brilliantly to adapt to the system they were given. We must celebrate their collective success."

Archie McNamara, who has been offered a place at Cambridge University to study Natural Science, achieved four A*s in Maths, Further Maths, Chemistry and Physics A Levels. Archie, who previously attended Wadebridge School, shared: "I'm really happy I got the grades I needed. My time at Callywith was a really positive experience. All the teachers are really approachable and supportive and I had a really

A Level Biology, Chemistry, Maths and Politics student Lottie Carr, who previously attended Sir James Smith's School, is enjoying life as a college student, saying: "College is very different from school, as you are treated as an adult and have freedom to plan your own study time. The staff at Callywith are so kind, they always want to help the best they can. I'm really looking forward to the College ski trip in April and to making new friends."

Callywith isn't just a first choice for students in North and East Cornwall, Cai Karseras Sumi, who recently moved to Cornwall from Japan to study A Levels in Economics, Politics and Maths and Academic Academy, spoke of why he chose to make the move to the UK: "The universities in Japan don't offer the course I wanted to do, I decided to come to Callywith and take A Level subjects because of the personal freedom compared to relative institutional conformity in public Japanese high schools generally, excellent learning environment and facilities and the support of the teachers.

"I was surprised on the options of subjects you are able to take at Callywith. The environment is more similar to a university; where you use the time when you don't have a class to study in the library or go to the gym."



New courses added for September 2022

Callywith College have responded to the demand from prospective students to expand its offer by adding nine new courses to its outstanding provision for September 2022.

Building on the success of its Ofsted Outstanding rating in January 2020, being ranked as the top sixth-form college nationally for qualification achievement rate and topping local league tables for A Level results in Spring 2020, the College has now expanded its offer of the widest choice of A Levels, Level 2 and 3 vocational courses and T Levels in North and East Cornwall.

The new courses available to students starting in September 2022 include Level 3 Uniformed Protective Services Diploma, A Level equivalents to be taken alongside other A Levels – Level 3 Extended Certificate in IT, Level 3 Extended Certificate in

Health & Social Care and Applied Diploma in Criminology and five new T Levels including Health, Management and Administration, Science, Digital Production and Digital Support.

The addition of these courses increase the opportunities for students to gain hands-on experience within the College's state-of-the-art facilities including fully-equipped science laboratories and IT suites.

The additional Extended Certificate and Applied Diploma courses to be taken alongside other A Levels, compliment the College's existing offer which include A Levels in Law, Psychology, Computer Science and Chemistry.

The five new T Level qualifications combine classroom theory, practical learning and a 45-day industry placement with an employer to make sure students have real experience of the workplace. The brand-new qualification has been developed in collaboration with employers so that the content meets the needs of industry and prepares students for work, an apprenticeship or higher level study.

Callywith Assistant Principal for Teaching and Learning Allyn Jefferies said: "The Callywith College Trust has approved the addition of these new courses as it continues its mission to work in association with Truro and Penwith College to offer a broad and comprehensive tertiary curriculum from the Callywith Campus.

"Callywith College is an outstanding provider of both A Level and vocational courses and addition of these new courses, increases the options for students choosing us for their post-16 study and benefit from our outstanding facilities, teaching and student support."

Callywith Active has recently begun offering 12 weeks of free exercise referral sessions to those living in East Cornwall. The Sport England funded programme is delivered by qualified Personal Trainers with Exercise Referral qualifications in the brandnew gym in the Fox building at Callywith College. An individual can refer themselves or they can be referred via a GP or a social prescriber from the East of Cornwall.

Julian Wills, the Callywith Active Coordinator, has been thrilled with the scheme's launch: "This is a really exciting time for the College because supporting the wider community can have so many benefits and is very important to us. The College should be the fulcrum of the whole of the community and if we can make that happen by using these initiatives, then that compliments all the educational programmes."

A key advantage of the programme is the support it provides to the NHS: "We know that the health service is under significant pressure and by being able to offer a GP exercise referral programme, it will hopefully alleviate some of the pressure that the practitioners and GPs are under. If we can use physical exercise as a way of improving people's health and wellbeing, rather than them depending on medication, that has to be a positive thing."










Choosing the right college course for you

Choosing what courses to study at college can be tough, especially when there's so many on offer, so here are some tips and advice to help make this decision seem less daunting.



1)

Look at all of your options

Make sure you look at all that's on offer and then look at the courses that initially attract your attention in more detail in the Callywith prospectus and at www.callywith.ac.uk. Consider whether you want to do A Levels - a great route if you want to keep your options open. Or if you know the area of study or career you wish to pursue, you can specialise in a Diploma or a T Level.



If you're completely stuck for ideas on which courses to pick, then think about the subjects you enjoy at school. Exploring your favourite school subject further at college could make you love it even more and open up a path for your future when it comes to your career.

Choose subjects you'll enjoy



Bo your research

Research is key when choosing your courses. Read the prospectus and course content on the Callywith website and attend open events at the College to talk to the staff teaching the subjects you're interested in. Look in detail at what you'll be studying and find out the type of assessments that are involved to determine which courses will suit you.

Think about your future

If you're thinking about university and have a degree in mind already, then take a look at the degree entry requirements. Some degree courses require specific subjects to be studied, visit www.ucas.com to check. A potential career goal could also lead you to pick subjects relating to that job you have in mind.



When choosing your courses, make sure you take a look at the entry requirements for the A Levels, Diploma or T Levels you are thinking of choosing. In the Callywith prospectus, the 'What to choose' section on pages 28-29, will give you more information on this.

Your A Level choices don't have to be similar

If you've decided to go down the route of A Levels, they don't have to be linked to each other. Studying a variety of subjects will keep your options open for your future if you are undecided. However, if you do have a particular degree or career in mind, then choosing similar subjects, all science related for example, or studying a specific Diploma or T Level, is not a problem either. Most combinations are possible.

Don't just choose what your friends are doing

Don't choose a course just because your friend is doing it. You're choosing for your own personal benefit. Going into a new classroom not knowing anyone might be daunting, but just remember that others are in the same boat as you. You'll make new friends on your course and can always meet up with your old friends at lunch time.

8 Write a list

Once you've had a think about all of your options, write them down in a list so they are easier to weigh up. Organising your thoughts on paper will most likely make a lot more sense and you can always come back later to reflect.




What if I don't like the course I've picked?

Don't panic if you start the course in September and think you've made the wrong decision. Talk to your teacher and you may be able to change your options. They are always going to have your best interests in mind and will encourage you to do what you think is best for you. Just remember to speak up.

Get more advice

If you're still struggling to decide, organise a meeting with the careers advisor at your school for more help, or visit the College on an open day to talk to subject staff. You will also have the opportunity to discuss your options at your admissions interview to help you decide on your course choices.




