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Callywith Reaccredited Investors in Diversity Award

Staff and students are celebrating after the college was reaccredited with the Investors in Diversity for Schools award (IiD).

The IiD award is a nationally recognised quality mark which provides an all-encompassing methodology for improving Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) practices in the workplace.

Callywith College first achieved the IiD award in March 2023 and was successfully reaccredited in April 2025. In a letter to the college, the National Centre for Diversity (NCD) said: "I would like to congratulate Callywith College, the staff and stakeholders on the successful achievement of the Investors in Diversity Silver award following the assessment process.

"The Investors in Diversity Silver journey and achievement of the standard gives a positive message to all the stakeholders, internal and external, and each person should be congratulated for their input and success of the organisation."

Our full-time A Level student cohort of around 400 students received results that collectively secured a 98% pass rate, with more than three quarters of entries being awarded A*-C grades.

Students studying Level 3 Extended Diploma and Diploma courses (equivalent to 3 A-levels) achieved equally excellent results, with 90% of the college's cohort of approximately 250 passing with Merit grades or higher.

Callywith College Principal Jon Grey said: "We are very proud of the results achieved by our students and it is a huge endorsement of the dedication shown by students and staff at the college over the last two years of study.


"The vast majority of our university applicants have successfully gained entry to their first-choice institutions. Across the college, we have so many great success stories and I'd like to congratulate all our students on what they have achieved and urge them to keep in touch with the college to let us know how their next steps into employment, apprenticeship or university are going."

Theo McKay did incredibly well to achieve three A*s and an A in Maths, Further Maths, Computer Science and Psychology A Levels. Theo, who is going on to do a degree apprenticeship in Aerospace Software Engineering with BAE, shared: "I'm very happy with my results. The staff at Callywith are so hard working and always on hand for any troubles you may have. I'm incredibly thankful and I couldn't have achieved my results without them."

Alice Riley, who previously attended Wadebridge School, has achieved A*A*B in History, Geography and Environmental Science A Levels and an A* in the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ). Alice, who plans to study Development Aid at University of Warwick, shared: "I am over the moon with my results, I got my first uni choice. The staff at Callywith were amazing and highly attentive, Callywith gave off a mature and work-like atmosphere where I thrived."

A Level students aren't the only ones achieving excellent results, BTEC Level 3 Sport Extended Diploma student Cadan Chenoweth, who previously attended Sir James Smith's School, achieved triple D*, the highest possible grade for this course.





Cadan, who is hoping to get into teaching in the sports industry by studying this at Plymouth Marjon University after a gap year, shared: "I am very pleased with my results, these will help me a lot in the future to gain jobs in a career sector that I enjoy.

We are extremely proud of each and every one of our students and wish them the very best in their future journeys - whether that be at university, in apprenticeships, or in the world of work and beyond.


2025 Leavers Celebrate in Style at Leavers' Summer Ball

Students attended the event to wish a fond farewell to their lecturers and to celebrate completing their final exams and their experiences over the past two years.


















Students had the opportunity to explore real industry environments, develop practical skills, and connect classroom learning to the workplace.

Georgia Graduates From Oxford University

We are extremely proud of former student Georgia Stevens, who has recently graduated in Law from Oxford University.

Georgia, who previously attended Holsworthy Community College and studied A Levels in Law, History, Geography and the Extended Project Qualification at Callywith, reflected on her time at university: "I had an amazing time studying Law at St Anne's College at Oxford University. I made lifelong friends and enjoyed playing netball alongside my studies, a highlight being representing Oxford in the annual Oxford vs Cambridge netball varsity match

"Graduating has been a very rewarding experience as I have worked really hard during my entire time at university. I enjoyed the more independent style of study that Oxford offers, which for law involved reading cases and articles set by the professors and submitting an essay weekly, before engaging on a discussion on my interests and opinions in a tutorial with a professor and only one other student. This greatly improved my confidence in my ability to think critically and to trust myself to formulate and put forward my ideas on a topic."

Georgia also highlighted the personal growth she experienced: "Oxford University is really challenging, there is a lot of work and an expectation to live up to your highest potential, but I am incredibly proud of myself to have grown so much academically whilst also maintaining a good work-life balance and growing as a person too."

Her advice to anyone considering applying to Oxford: "Trust yourself enough to believe that you can do it! Having the confidence to apply is honestly the biggest first hurdle, and with that confidence, you can work on your interviewing and writing skills to get an offer. Lots of people are put off by the intense course structure and the intimidating environment, but I found I had a much better social life when I was being pushed academically, as it taught me to manage my deadlines and work harder to ensure to leave time to have fun outside of my degree. You're also encouraged to get involved in lots of societies at Oxford where I met lots of new friends too."



Georgia spoke of the support and guidance she received at Callywith: "My time at Callywith was pivotal in applying for Oxford. I had never considered going to Oxford until my Law Lecturer Charlotte encouraged me to attend an Oxbridge lecture run by Callywith's Academic Academy, and from then on I decided I had nothing to lose by applying. I attended weekly Oxbridge sessions where I was given guidance on how to make my application stand out and attended practice interviews to help me prepare."

Georgia shared her exciting next steps: "I have accepted a job offer to be a corporate lawyer in London at one of the top law firms in the world. I completed an internship at the firm and really enjoyed working on high-value transactions in both the corporate and litigation sphere. Before I start my job, I will be undertaking a 1-year Masters in Legal Practice in London to enhance my corporate law knowledge and skills."

Sam Winters, who created the campaign, says: "Menstrual health is an important part of overall wellbeing. This campaign is about making support more accessible and sparking positive conversations around how we care for ourselves and each other."

What's in the Kits?

Daisy Kit – A rescue kit for period care and clean up essentials.

Includes: Period pants, black leggings, a pad and tampon, wipes and plastic disposal bag.

Pick up from Student Services or scan the QR code (on posters across campus & in toilets) for delivery to you.

Cosy Kit – A moment of relief and warmth.

Includes: A soothing peppermint tea bag, dark chocolate (vegan & allergen-free options available) in a to-go cup.

Soothing Station – Support for intense pelvic or period pains.

Includes: Wearable heat pads, blankets, microwaveable wheat bags, a massage heat pad, and reusable hot/cold gel packs (you can book items to take to class)

Sophie Begins Journey as a Vet

We're so proud of Sophie Deis-Horton, one of our very first students to join Callywith College back in 2017, who has recently qualified as a vet!

After attending Fowey River Academy, Sophie studied A Level English Literature, Biology, and Chemistry at Callywith. She was also part of Callywith's Medics' and Academic Academies and has now graduated in Veterinary Medicine from the University of Liverpool.



She also credited the support she received at Callywith as instrumental in helping her reach her goals: "All the lecturers were incredibly supportive, Babs in particular was incredible at helping me prepare for interviews and keeping me positive when everything seemed daunting."

For those aspiring to follow in her footsteps, Sophie offered some valuable advice: "See as much as possible and immerse yourself in all aspects of veterinary before and during the course - especially the areas that scare you. You have to get comfortable with all animals from chickens to cows and everything in between. Vet schools love people who show awareness of the realities of the job and the course, and people who show they are able to put themselves out of their comfort zone.



"The best piece of advice I got was to never turn down a cup of tea when on placement - it gives you a chance to make small talk and connect with the client/placement provider and gives you a couple minutes to chill!"

Sophie shared her plans for the future: "I would love to do some competition work and more racing work, as well as becoming more experienced in sports medicine in general."



Sophie has just begun her career as an equine vet in Lambourn and shared some insight into her exciting new role: "The practice mainly works with eventing/sports horses and racehorses. I like to think of it as being the mechanic of the horse world, stepping in to keep the horses running and performing well.

"It's been daunting and a little terrifying making the transition from student to vet but thankfully I've found a supportive first practice and I'm enjoying every day."

Reflecting on her time at university, Sophie said: "It was a long 5 years, but a great experience. You meet so many new people and learn so much about yourself - I've definitely grown into a more confident and happy person both professionally and socially! I've met some incredible people (both fellow students and lecturers) that I hope to stay in touch with."



Destinations Day Offers Students Insights Into Future Pathways

Our annual Destinations Day 2 for second-year students, provided a fantastic opportunity to explore the wide range of progression pathways available beyond college.



Throughout the day, students attended insightful talks featuring over 40 employers and institutions, including Imerys, Bishop Fleming, Babcock, NHS, Bunnyhomes, Royal Navy and Devon & Cornwall Police.

Students gained valuable insights into careers across various sectors, including law, accountancy, IT, photography, HR, pharmacy, civil engineering, games design, physiotherapy, protective services, education, and many more.

In addition to exploring careers, students also explored post-18 pathways including apprenticeships, gap years and higher education, with presentations on applying to Oxbridge universities, choosing a university and from University of Bath, Falmouth University, University of Plymouth, Plymouth Marjon University, Arts University Plymouth, and University of Exeter.







Additional sessions covered topics such as student finance, writing CV and cover letters, employment interviews and budgeting with Next Steps SW.

It was also fantastic to welcome back former Callywith students who returned to share their inspiring journeys and motivate the next generation, including Mia Beard, once an A Level Maths, Physics and Biology student, who recently completed a Master's in Mathematical and Theoretical Physics at Oxford University and is now embarking on a PhD specialising in geometry. Kenan Nicholas, who studied the Business Extended Diploma, shared his remarkable transition from student to entrepreneur, detailing how he successfully established and grew his own businesses. Olli Sandercock, a former A Level Maths, Physics, and Geography student, completed a Master's in Civil Engineering at Swansea University and is currently working in construction with Mott MacDonald and Tristan Young, who studied the IT Extended Diploma and has completed a degree apprenticeship in Digital and Technology Solutions with CACI Ltd.

Former art & design students and Lily Wells, a former Children's Play, Learning and Development student, who is in her final year studying Primary Education at UWE Bristol, also returned to share their experiences at university.

Thinking Big: Students Shine in Olympiad Competitions

Taking part in Olympiad competitions gives our students the chance to stretch their problemsolving skills beyond the classroom. Much more than an academic test, it's a chance to enhance university and career applications and celebrate the top talents of Callywith College.

UK Mathematical Olympiad for Girls

Uliana Andrieieva has achieved remarkable success by earning a Distinction - the highest award - in the UK Mathematical Olympiad for Girls

13 of our A Level Maths students took part in the competition, run by the UK Mathematics Trust (UKMT) to inspire more young women to engage in competitive mathematics.

The competition consists of five highly demanding problems that really test participants' problem-solving and logical-thinking skills.

Second-year A Level Maths and Further Maths student Uliana achieved the highest score in the college, securing a Distinction - a brilliant achievement given the difficulty of the questions. Uliana also achieved a Silver award in the Senior Maths Challenge. Four students were just 2 marks short of achieving a Merit, the second highest award.

Well done to Uliana and to all who took part!

Senior Maths Challenge

At the end of November, eight of our A Level Maths and Further Maths students sat the Senior Kangaroo Maths Challenge, an event that tests advanced mathematical and problem-solving skills.

All eight students had qualified by achieving a gold award in the UKMT



Maths Challenge earlier in the term – an impressive feat in itself. Their abilities were then put to the test across 20 challenging problems in the Senior Kangaroo Maths Challenge.

Alex Knobloch, Alfie Vanderplank, and Toby Sanders earned Merits, placing them in the top 25% of entrants - an excellent result!

Toby Sanders achieved the highest score and a Callywith record of 80 out of 100!

Well done to Toby, Alex and Alfie and all involved – a fantastic achievement!



Chemistry Olympiad

Earlier this year, 16,216 students from 1,502 schools sat the UK Chemistry Olympiad exam paper.



This year, Callywith College students performed brilliantly, earning 14 awards, including Gold, Silver, and Bronze!

Known for its challenging, but intriguing questions, the Olympiad didn't disappoint this year with one question starting: 'While Charlie XCX's Brat summer of 2024 may be over, this summer will be Paddington's BrAt Bear Summer. Much like Brat summer, the compound BrAt doesn't last forever. This is due to the radioactive decay of astatine.'

British Biology Olympiad

We had some excellent results in the British Biology Olympiad competition this year!



Second year A Level Biology student Oliver Rudge achieved a Gold certificate, and is now competing for a place on the International Team! Meanwhile, second-year A Level student Archie Cann, along with first-year students Finlay Dunn and Rosie Rea, secured Silver certificates, while first-year student Chloe Edwards achieved Bronze.

The British Biology Olympiad competition challenges and stimulates students with an interest in biology to expand and extend their talents.

It enables students to demonstrate their talent and to be suitably rewarded with publicly recognised certificates.

The competition presents students with topics and ideas which they may not be familiar with, so will compete with their problem solving skills and understanding of core biological principles. It is a fantastic opportunity to stretch students beyond the scope of their course curriculum, which puts them ahead of others on university and job applications.

Protective Services Police Work Experience

From 10th - 14th February, the Callywith Uniformed Protective Services team proudly hosted our third annual Year 12 Police Work Experience Week with Devon & Cornwall Police, a flagship event for our course, attracting students from across East Cornwall and Devon.

Students applied through a police-style application before gaining hands-on experience with the Dog Unit, Forensics, Traffic Police, Armed Response, Drone Unit and more. They also developed teamwork, leadership, and discipline, culminating in a passing out parade in front of family and friends.

Well done to all students - you were outstanding! Huge thanks to Devon & Cornwall Police for another amazing week.

If he wants it, there's definitely a career to be had in scientific illustration or in technical writing where his ability to communicate clearly and creatively would be a real asset."

Level 3 Performing & Production Art Extended Diploma students' production of RAVERS marked the final performance for our amazing students - and what a way to end their course.







Look at all of your options

Make sure you look at all that's on offer and then look at the courses that initially attract your attention in more detail in the Callywith prospectus and at callywith.ac.uk. Consider whether you want to do A Levels - a great route if you want to keep your options open. Or if you know the area of study or career you wish to pursue, you can specialise in a Diploma or T Level.



Think about your future

If you're thinking about university and have a degree in mind already, then take a look at the degree entry requirements. Some degree courses require specific subjects to be studied, visit ucas.com to check. A potential career goal could also lead you to pick subjects relating to that job you have in mind.

Choose subjects you'll enjoy

If you're completely stuck for ideas on which courses to pick, then think about the subjects you enjoy at school. Exploring your favourite school subject further at college could make you love it even more and open up a path for your future when it comes to your career.



Look at entry requirements

When choosing your courses, make sure you take a look at the entry requirements for the A Levels, Diploma or T Level you are thinking of choosing. In the Callywith prospectus, the 'What to choose' section on pages 30-31, will give you more information on this



Write a list

Once you've had a think about all of your options, write them down in a list so they are easier to weigh up. Organising your thoughts on paper will most likely make a lot more sense and you can always come back later to reflect.



Do your research

Research is key when choosing your courses. Read the prospectus and course content on the Callywith website and attend open events at the college to talk to the staff teaching the subjects you're interested in. Look in detail at what you'll be studying and find out the type of assessments that are involved to determine which courses will suit you.



Your A Level choices don't have to be similar

If you've decided to go down the route of A Levels, they don't have to be linked to each other. Studying a variety of subjects will keep your options open for your future if you are undecided. However, if you do have a particular degree or career in mind, then choosing similar subjects, all science related for example, or studying a specific Diploma, is not a problem either. Most combinations are possible.



What if I don't like the course I've picked?

Don't panic if you start the course in September and think you've made the wrong decision. Talk to your teacher and you may be able to change your options. They are always going to have your best interests in mind and will encourage you to do what you think is best for you. Just remember to speak up.





Don't just choose what your friends are doing

Don't choose a course just because your friend is doing it. You're choosing for your own personal benefit. Going into a new classroom not knowing anyone might be daunting, but just remember that others are in the same boat as you. You'll make new friends on your course and can always meet up with your old friends at lunch time.



Get more advice

If you're still struggling to decide, organise a meeting with the careers advisor at your school for more help, or visit the college on an open day to talk to subject staff. You will also have the opportunity to discuss your options at your admissions interview to help you decide on your course choices.

We're really proud to be part of Olivia's refereeing journey and excited to see all the amazing things she'll accomplish next!




Liam Steps Up to England U18 Squad

This is an amazing achievement; we couldn't be prouder of Liam and wish him the best of luck!




Ocearna Represents England in GB Surfing Cup


