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Callywith joins Truro and Penwith to ride high in national performance measures





Department for Education achievement data published in January 2020 shows that Callywith College, in its first ever showing in the tables, has followed in the long tradition of its sponsor organisation Truro and Penwith College in delivering outstanding outcomes for post-16 students.

Callywith College has excelled on all measures amongst Cornwall schools and has already cemented its place as the second largest provider of post-16 academic qualifications in Cornwall, just two years after opening in September 2017.

Comparative data for Callywith College, shows that at 34.16, its A Level point score per entry is significantly above the national average for state funded schools and colleges of 32.87.

On the measure of Academic Value Added, Callywith College is ranked the third highest across all Cornwall post-16 performance, while having double the number of students of the top two providers combined.

This academic quality is endorsed in the number of Callywith students who have progressed to top universities this academic year, with a total of 13 students securing Oxbridge interviews since opening.

The latest tables clearly demonstrate the numbers' trend and patterns of post-16 learner choice across Cornwall. Whereas Truro and Penwith College has student numbers that are significantly higher than all other providers, accounting for almost half the total number of A Level entries taken in Cornwall, Callywith is already the second largest provider of such qualifications in the county,

a remarkable situation for a new provider.

Truro and Penwith Principal and Chair of Callywith David Walrond said: "The aim in establishing Callywith College in 2017 was to have a centre of post-16 excellence on a third campus for north and east Cornwall that fully matched the quality of experience and outcomes of the sponsor, Truro and Penwith College. The latest government tables show this has been achieved."

To have come this far, this fast is a wonderful tribute to all staff, trustees and students at Callywith.

Callywith Principal Jon Grey attributed Callywith's excellent showing to high levels of student support, reinforcing high expectations of learners and outstanding teaching and learning.

He said: "We looked forward to our first ever appearance in local and national league tables with great anticipation. We knew last summer that the exam results were excellent but it's only now that we see just how well we rate against county and national benchmarks.

The results are a very powerful endorsement of the brilliant work of our staff and students and I'm delighted for the whole of our large and growing College community."

# CALLYWITH COLLEGE IS OUTSTANDING IT IS OFFICIAL

The bold front page of the Ofsted report says it all: Callywith College is Outstanding, Grade 1 in every single category.

This is an exceptional and rare achievement by any school or college, but what makes this outcome even more remarkable is that Callywith has been in existence for just two and a half years. In that time, sponsored by Truro and Penwith College, and with levels of learner demand and growth unprecedented anywhere nationally, it has already become the choice of 1,100 post-16 students from north and east Cornwall.

The recurring Ofsted theme throughout the report is about a college which, in Inspectors' words, "raises the aspirations and achievements and improves the life chances of young people living in one of the poorest regions in the UK".

Seven Inspectors spent three days in January scrutinising every aspect of the College's work, analysing data, interviewing hundreds of stakeholders, not just students, staff and trustees, but employers, parents and others from across the wider community which now uses and benefits from Callywith.

"Since the opening of Callywith College in September 2017", the reports says, "leaders, managers and staff have worked tirelessly to create a culture of high expectations for all." Describing the learner experience, inspectors said: "Students are overwhelmingly positive about all aspects of college life. They feel privileged to be a student there and take an immense pride in being part of the Callywith College community. Many students travel a considerable distance to attend. They thrive under the exceptionally supportive and caring environment".

The new inspection framework foregrounds the content and relevance of the curriculum as well as the quality of provision. Ofsted found a curriculum which is, "highly effective in enabling students to reach their long-term aspirations." The report concluded that Callywith provides, "a wide range of carefully designed academic and vocational learning programmes and high-quality teaching, assessment and support." Inspectors noted that, "teachers have a passion for the subjects they teach, have excellent subject knowledge and vocational experience.'

Recognising the highly inclusive nature of the College, inspectors also praised the, "highly-effective additional support from staff and a range of external agencies," which helps students with SEND (special educational needs and disability), high needs and from disadvantaged backgrounds to, "continue with their studies, become more independent and make progress in line with their peers."

Commenting on the Outstanding Ofsted grades, Principal Jon Grey said: "Since opening Callywith College we have been privileged to work with so many truly inspirational young people. This fantastic report follows on the heels of their achievements and the College's exceptional performance in our first ever showing in the Department for Education attainment tables. I am delighted for all my colleagues that their collective brilliance and dedicated hard work has been recognised so clearly in this report. It seems no time at all since we were interviewing our first applicants in a temporary hut at the edge of a building site and assuring them that not only would the College be ready for opening day but would be somewhere that they would thrive, receive the very best teaching and support, and leave us, as Ofsted have just confirmed, "very well prepared for their futures."

Assistant Principal Lucy Maggs said: "What emerges so strongly from this report is that, as well as recognising Callywith's outstanding teaching, inspectors discovered and praised a thriving supportive community and inclusive culture where, as they put it, 'students are constantly reminded of their ability and worth by staff' and, 'students are inspired to do well because staff treat them with great respect'. I'm not sure we could have chosen better accolades ourselves to reflect the shared vision, mission and ethos of Callywith College and I am so proud of every member of staff and every student who have all worked together to create a very special place in which to work and study."

# Students are overwhelmingly positive about all aspects of college life

David Walrond, Callywith's Chair of Trustees and Principal at Truro and Penwith College, said: "There was huge belief and determination among colleagues from the start of the Callywith project that something special really could be delivered and was needed. I am delighted that inspectors praised the 'clear and ambitious vision for the College'. The Department for Education backed the vision and ambition based on our track record. Truro and Penwith College provided co-investment, excellent foundations, and a blueprint, but a college is not a blueprint. It is the hard work and shared purpose of Callywith's exceptional staff, students and trustees which created a college whose work Ofsted found transformative."

In terms of next steps for the Grade 1 College, its Chair added: "Trustees are determined not to stop here. Callywith needs to grow to meet the volume of post-16 applications and to extend the range of its work in response to local demand for technical further education, including more work-based learning and the prospect of higher levels of study. These are also the national priorities for post-16 education and skills and so we can make a compelling case."

Some of Callywith's very first cohort of students return to talk to Academic Academy students after their first term of university.

We welcomed George Maunder, who is now studying Modern Foreign Languages at Swansea University, Becca Langford, who studies Psychology and Education at Homerton College - University of Cambridge, Teneisha Duguid, who studies Medicine at Aston University in Birmingham, Anna Graham-Jones who studies Geography at University of Leeds and Pedro Corsico who studies Biomedical Sciences at University of Exeter.

The former Callywith students were asked plenty of questions by our current students who were keen to find out more about university life, both academic and social!

Students shared their experiences including the changes from college to university life such as having more independence and needing to manage your own time, as well as useful tips including choosing which university to study at - doing your research, visiting the city and attending lots of open events, and making sure you have a good work/life balance once you start your new life at uni.

George also spoke about how it's ok to have doubts and a little 'wobble' when you start uni and that there are always others that feel the same way.


Teneisha added: "It's important to remember that everyone is in the same position and not to bottle things up and to talk to your flatmates, friends and family about how you are feeling."

# HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION'S GREAT DEBATE

A Level History students Maddy and Lacey recently participated in The Historical Association's Great Debate 2020 - a national public-speaking competition for sixth-form students - competing alongside Truro and Penwith College students, with Maddy and Lacey getting first place and runner up.

The competition is being held in partnership with the UK Parliament's Vote 100 project and the Grand Final will take place on the 28th March 2020 at Windsor Castle in partnership with BBC World Histories Magazine, which Maddy will therefore be attending.

The students had to present a five minute speech answering this year's question: 'Should we judge historical figures by the morals of today?'

History Lecturer Louise Doney said: "I was extremely proud of all the students involved. They had researched the debate thoroughly, presented their views professionally and were rewarded for their hard work. They each had different viewpoints on the focus of the debate and the judges remarked on the presentation skills and the students ability to refer to a number of key historical figures and events in relation to the debate."

The judges said: "The students put forward great arguments and did it in a really effective way and engaged with the audience. I know the students will have

got much from the experience and hopefully will continue with public speaking in the future now that this has boosted their confidence."



### STUDENTS SEARCH FOR BIG ANSWERS AT 'BIG DEBATE'

Callywith's very first Big Debate aimed to develop students' spiritual, moral, social, ethical and cultural awareness and understanding. A diverse panel of experts discussed and debated hot topics with students.

The 'Question Time' style debate included a diverse panel of experts with an understanding and background in a range of faiths, beliefs, philosophies and sociologies, who could discuss and debate hot topics confidently with young people.

Callywith students completed a survey prior to the debate, in which they voted on a range of topics to be included, as well as making their own suggestions. The topics were then shortlisted to the six most popular. These included: Climate Change & Sustainability. What does it mean to be a good person? What is happiness? What does it mean to be kind? What is success? What is the difference between selfishness and self-care?

The debate, facilitated by Politics and History Lecturer Jonny Goodhew, consisted of 8 panellists including: Jeremy Jacobson - the chairman of Kehillat Kernow (the Jewish Community in Cornwall) who also worked for the British Council for many years in different parts of the world, Qudsia Ward and Muna Ahmad - Muslim representatives from the Ahmadiyya Muslim Association, Philomena Clifford -

Trustee of Cornwall Faith Forum and Baha'i Representative, Callywith Health and Social Care Lecturer Richard Macblain, Elly Sheard – Chaplaincy Coordinator across Truro, Penwith and Callywith campuses and the new Callywith Chaplain Liz Lane and Callywith student Freya Greaves.

Callywith student Freya Greaves, who was one of the panellists, said: "It was a very positive, constructive debate, it's nice to have such positivity in such a polarising time. I also think it's important to expose people of a college age, when they are starting to look around the world in a more critical way, to different perspectives and faith groups, especially in Cornwall where there is not such a high level of diversity. It was really good to look at such relevant topics of debate in more detail, to hear others points of view and to get more people actively engaged with them."

The debate also tied in with the re-launch of the Callywith Chaplaincy and listening service which provides a welcoming and non-judgemental space for people from all faiths and backgrounds, as well as providing a safe place in which students can explore their thoughts, feelings, values and beliefs.

Due to the success of the debate, we are planning to make this a regular event so any topics that are not covered will be included in The event was a great success.

Callywith Games Lecturer Greg Bott who joined the students on the trip said: "The London trip, and in particular EGX, represents the first chance for the students to immerse themselves in cultures past and present. These experiences help the students to collate primary research through photography and sketches for their live project work, which could be used to inspire 3D scene design or character concept development.

EGX is a gaming festival like no other, featuring live competitions, exclusive gameplay events for unreleased titles, indie games developers who the students are able to liaise with, hundreds of merch stalls and live cosplay.

There are also representatives of the many games design and animation BA courses present, so students looking for advice or portfolio-building guidance, can network with these individuals and begin thinking about their next steps after college."

# LAW BAR MOCK TRIAL TEAM MAKE FINAL ROUND

Callywith's Law Bar Mock Trial team took part in the regional competition at Plymouth Combined Court. This was the College's first time entering and out of 8 teams from across the South West, Callywith made it all the way to the final round!

In the final head to head, the team of 15 A Level Law students missed out on attending the national final by the tiniest of margins.

The students had just 5 weeks to prepare, taking on roles of prosecution and defence barristers, witnesses, court clerk, usher, court artist and jurors. The judges adjudicating the competition praised Callywith students for their professional approach, confident delivery and superb preparation.

A Level Law student Ellie Wilson, who took on one of the

prosecution barrister roles, said: "Bar Mock Trial gave me the opportunity to experience life in a real court, boost my confidence, further my knowledge on the subject as a whole and meet lots of new people! It showed me that this is what I want to do as a career, and I loved every second!"

Callywith Law Lecturer Charlotte Andrews praised the students efforts: "We were delighted with the performances after the first three rounds and had a quiet confidence, but we were still gobsmacked when we made the final two! They should be very proud of themselves."

First year A Level Media students recently won The Gender Equality Collective's national #SmashingStereotypes competition aimed at challenging damaging stereotypes in a creative way.


Students entered photography, posters and magazine covers which challenged stereotypical representations of gender in the media.



#### CHOOSING THE RIGHT COLLEGE COURSE FOR YOU

Choosing what courses to study at college can be tough, especially when there's so many on offer, so here are some tips and advice to help make this decision seem less daunting.

#### Look at all of your options

Even though the list can look overwhelming, make sure you look at all that's on offer. Disregard the courses that you're definitely not interested in and then look at the ones that initially attract your attention in more detail in the Callywith prospectus and at www.callywith.ac.uk. Consider whether you want to either do A Levels in three to four different subjects, which is a great route if you want to keep your options open, or specialise in a Diploma (equivalent to 3 A Levels) if you know the area of study or career pathway you wish to pursue.

#### Choose subjects you'll enjoy

If you're completely stuck for ideas on which courses to pick, then think back to the subjects you enjoyed at school. Exploring your favourite school subject further at college could make you love it even more and open up a path for your future when it comes to your career. However, still remember to look at the specifics of the course as it may be slightly different from the GCSE subjects you're used to.

#### 3 Do your research

Research is key when choosing your courses. Read the prospectus and course content on the Callywith website and attend open events to talk to the staff teaching the subjects to get all the information on offer. Don't just pick the course based on the name; look in detail at what you'll be studying. Find out the type of assessments that are involved, whether it's all exams, all coursework, or a mixture of both and determine whether this suits you or not.

#### Think about your future

If you're thinking about university and have a degree in mind already, then take a look at the entry requirements or pick a subject that is likely to help you get on to the course - some degree courses require specific subjects to be studied, visit www. ucas.ac.uk to check. A potential career goal could also lead you to pick subjects relating to that job you have in mind. Any available work experience that you can get involved with alongside your studies will help determine if the career is something you really want to pursue.

#### 5 Look at entry requirements

When choosing your courses, make sure you take a look at the entry requirements for the A Levels or Diploma you are thinking of choosing. In the Callywith prospectus, the 'What to choose' section on pages 20 - 21 will give you more information on this.

### Your A Level choices don't have to be similar

If you've decided to go down the route of A Levels, they don't have to be linked to each other. If you want to study a combination of Maths, English and Art, then go for it. In fact, some universities prefer a mixed range of A Levels when it comes to entry requirements for degrees. This will also keep your options open for your future if you are undecided. However, if you do have a particular degree or career in mind, then choosing similar subjects, all science related for example, or studying a specific Diploma, is not a problem either. Most combinations are possible.

### Don't just choose what your friends are doing

If your best friend is a keen mathematician but the thought of simultaneous equations sends your mind spinning, don't choose a Maths A Level just because your friend is doing it. You're choosing for your own personal benefit. Going into a new classroom not knowing anyone might be daunting, but just remember that others are in the same boat as you. You'll make new friends on your course and can always meet up with your old friends at lunch time.

#### Write a list

Once you've had a think about all of your options, write them down in a list so they are easier to weigh up.
Organising your thoughts on paper will most likely make a lot more sense and you can always come back later to reflect.

# What if I don't like the course I've picked?

Don't panic if you start the course in September and think you've made the wrong decision. Talk to your tutor and you may be able to change your options if you let them know early enough. They are always going to have your best interests in mind and will encourage you to do what you think is best for you. Just remember to speak up.

#### Get more advice

If you're still struggling to decide, organise a meeting with the careers advisor at your school for more help, or visit the College on an open day to talk to subject staff. You will also have the opportunity to discuss your options at your admissions interview to help you decide on your course choices.


